In addition, they are expected to draw on their own experience and knowledge, where appropriate, in respect of any challenges facing the Group and in relation to the development of proposals on strategy.</p> <p>The current size and composition of the Board is within a range which is appropriate. We also believe that the current size of the Board is sufficiently structured to enable its Board Committees to properly assist the Board in the execution of its duties and responsibilities.</p> <p>The spread of nationalities, age and gender of the Directors reflects the geographical reach of the Group and we consider that the Board as a whole has the appropriate blend of skills, knowledge and experience, from a wide range of industries and backgrounds, necessary to lead the Group.</p>

Amongst others, the potential candidates must fulfil the criteria used in the definition of “independent directors” prescribed by the Main Market Listing Requirements of Bursa Malaysia Securities Berhad and being able to bring independent and objective judgement to the Board.</li></ul> <p>An annual assessment will be carried out annually to review the contribution of each Director.
